Project Description



Project Goal

 To address the credential gap and potential resulting limited employment mobility of individuals working as personal care workers and home support workers through the development of a sectorsupported PLAR model for continuing care

Project Description (Continued)

Objectives

- To assess and recognize the credentials of the current continuing care workforce using a recognized PLAR process
- To improve employment mobility of workforce through labour force access to CCA certification
- To improve recognition of prior learning and life experiences, thereby increasing the number of qualified workers



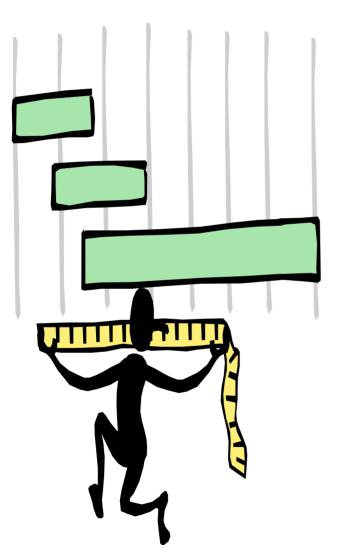

- Research and develop PLAR process
- Train assessors
- Select pilot sites
- Pilot and evaluate process
- Develop recommendations

PLAR Pilot

- Participants
 - Rural, nursing home (Alderwood Rest Home)
 - Start: 7; End: 5
 - Urban, home support (RJF Health Services, Northwood Home
 Care Ltd.)
 - Start: 10; End: 6
- Duration
 - November '04 January '05



"PLAR helped me realize just how much I already knew and gave me more confidence in the care I provide to my clients".

Evaluation



- Key conclusions included:
 - Model of collaboration and partnership very successful
 - Access to supports and resources significant challenge
 - Issues related to role definitions and expectations of stakeholders
 - Challenges with recognizing informal learning
 - 75% cap for both theoretical and clinical components concern for participants

Evaluation (Continued)

- Key conclusions included:
 - Timing most challenging factor
 - Applicants were motivated to take
 advantage of opportunity despite workload
 - Stakeholders universally recognized that the PLAR process will help current workforce move towards standardized CCA certification
 - Stakeholders now have a clear understanding of the impact of the PLAR process
